1	Although this is not an RFP, is it okay to reference pricing as they relate to ideas of procurement methods?	The RFI is seeking information on strategies to obtain sufficient hardware and internet access for all students, including free and low-cost options. RFI responses may include information on pricing.
2	Will New Jersey be able to write emergency contracts to fit the scope/needs during the pandemic?	The RFI is focused on gathering information and perspectives about the digital divide. Any potential contracting or purchasing process by NJEDA, NJ DOE and/or other state entities, is not the purview of this RFI.
3	Is the State's Intention to create/mandate an overarching solution to school districts receiving the grants or to give guidance on potential solutions?	The RFI is not making any statement or providing any notification, directly or indirectly, regarding decisions regarding the reopening of schools and the methodology of educating New Jersey students. The NJ DOE 'Restart & Recovery Plan: The Road Back' guidelines released on June 26 provides guidance for districts to create reopening plans – including potential virtual learning – that is best suited to the needs of the students, teachers and families in their community. Please also note that this RFI is not a grant or funding opportunity.
4	Is the State's intention to finalize on just one solution or offer a catalogue of alternative solutions for the local School Boards?	The RFI is seeking perspectives and potential solutions. The NJEDA plans to share the information received with the NJDOE which may, in turn, distribute that information to the local school districts and school boards.

5	Is the state considering funding for non-public schools? Charters?	This RFI does not directly address the source or allocation of funding. Please note that this RFI is not a grant or funding opportunity. However, please also note that on July 16, Governor Murphy announced that \$6 million in Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) funds will be available for nonpublic schools.
6	Are you looking to include staff (teachers) in this initiative?	The RFI includes several considerations specific to educators' remote learning capacity. For example, one of the core areas in which the RFI aims to gather information is training, technical assistance and professional development for students, parents/guardians, and educators who are not experienced in effective remote learning methods, including use of technology. Several of the questions in the RFI are designed to solicit information regarding educators' professional development needs (see, e.g. #s 15, 17, and 18). Specifically, regarding access to educational technology hardware and connectivity devices, the RFI focuses primarily on bridging the digital divide to ensure student access.
7	Regarding the State's question "What are the biggest challenges/concerns/gaps in the State's current remote learning and educational technology ecosystem?" Can the State give more information on the challenges that it is facing and what the State is attempting to solve as a result of this RFI?	The RFI provides a broad overview of the scope of the digital divide throughout the state and the goals of the initiative (to ensure that New Jersey's students, educators and parents/guardians have sufficient access to the appropriate digital technology, internet connectivity and training to foster successful remote learning (as needed)). The RFI also asks respondents to provide information about the remote learning needs of specific populations that may be particularly impacted by the digital divide. Those sections of the RFI provide context for respondents to elaborate on challenges.

Any item, good, service, or professional development/technical assistance provided by a vendor may need to be modified to assist a district in meeting this requirement.”
